Rector Reflection A BLESSED ADVENT TO ALL!



Advent is a time of drawing back and preparing for the coming of the Christ Child. This year we are being asked to do so much more because we are in the midst of this world-wide pandemic.

Our holidays this year are not the same as in the past as we continue through yet another upsurge of the Covid-19 virus. In this time of pandemic we continue to show love for our neighbors and one another by wearing our masks, washing our hands frequently, keeping our distance and not gathering in large groups – as hard as that is at this time of the year. Some of you were alone or in small groups for Thanksgiving. I did not have Thanksgiving with my son for the 1st time since he was born. He and Nicky ate alone with their elderly cat, Tizzy. I had a quiet dinner in the Dining Room here at the Village with a few friends. Except for dinner I spent the day in my apartment. It was pouring most of the day and I couldn't go out for a walk.

But, I am thankful – for health, for a home, for food and for those who worked to prepare and serve it, for care that has kept me safe, that no one in my family has contracted the virus, and, especially, for the opportunity to continue to provide worship for the parish - virtually.

The downside of virtual worship is that we are not able to reach all of the parishioners because either they don't have the technology - or don't have the energy to do yet another Zoom service. I certainly understand that. For many months the clergy were having many meetings each week – sometimes 2-3 a day. Now there are just a few each month plus the meetings with the Church Pension Fund (for my other role as Chaplain to the Retired Clergy, Spouses and Surviving Spouses). Our Bishops are on Zoom daily from early morning until 9 PM, so I feel fortunate.

The upside of Virtual worship is that many of us have worshipped with parishes around the world. I have been listening to morning prayers daily with the Dean of Canterbury Cathedral. He leads them out in the beautiful gardens of the Cathedral. They are in yet another shut down in England, so once again that beautiful Cathedral is closed. He shares historical information of that date and talks a bit about the plantings in the garden where he sits that day. On Saturdays he sits in the pen with the pigs and chickens and one very noisy duck! Usually one of the Cathedral cats sits with the Dean as he speaks.

As you know, many local parishes livestream their worship and also offer it on YouTube. I visit some of them when I am able. Clearly things will be forever changed with the new technology. When we regather we will still be able to include those at home who can't attend – and have the technology to join us. That is here to stay.



ADVENT WREATH BLESSING

Beginning on Nov. 29th, the 1st Sunday of Advent, we bless our advent wreaths. If you have an advent wreath at home, keep it nearby and we will bless the wreaths together on our Sunday Zoom service each week of the advent season.

We are all quite weary of this virus and how it has changed and affected our lives. We are saddened as we hear of more and more cases of the Covid-19 Virus - and more and more deaths. The numbers are staggering. It is sad that so many businesses are struggling to survive or have already closed. It is sad that more and more people are going hungry each day and many are losing their jobs and homes. We worry for all of the children, parents and teachers who struggle to do education in very different and often stressful ways.

We try to be encouraged as the word that vaccines will soon be available. That will be the thing that allows us to resume our lives more normally again. But, meanwhile, we must not give up hope. The 1st Candle of Advent is often called the Candle of Hope – “for a Saviour who will bring us freedom and peace.” We long for freedom in so many ways these days. We long for peace – in our own country and in a world that is torn by strife and division.

I have a book of Advent and Christmas hymns. One of my favorites says, “Patience, people, till the Lord is come....Steady your hearts, for the Lord is close at hand. And do not grumble one against the other. Patience, people, for the Lord is coming.”

Another is, “A Time will come for singing....” This is a good one to remind us that life has both sorrows and joys. Be sure to look for the joys in the midst of the sorrows of these times.

Advent is the beginning of the Church Year. May our prayers each day be for a new year with hope and health and peace for all.

Good morning!

That basket in the church hall which is usually filled with donations for the Whitman Food Pantry has been empty for many months. But the needs of all food pantries have increased, some by 50% and more, much more. People who were once donors to their local pantries now find themselves clients due to job losses and other economic pressures of the pandemic. The Greater Boston Food Bank advises that 1 in 11 people in Eastern Massachusetts is food insecure. Large grocery store chains continue to help, but are no longer able to contribute the large quantities of fresh and non-perishable foods they routinely sent to pantries—as we know from personal experience, our favorite grocery stores often have empty shelves themselves. For personal health and safety reasons, most food pantries are making do with limited volunteer staffing and prefer to receive financial donations that they use to buy food to distribute.

The Greater Boston Food Bank distributes to pantries through-out the region. Some outreach-based organizations like the Salvation Army and St. Vincent DePaul serve cities and towns in our area. Many towns have their own food pantries. I have listed a few here, along with addresses (and some phone numbers and URLs), should you wish to make donations.

I received a letter the other day from channel 7 & 56 about closing or delays for schools or business. It started by saying, "It has been a year like no other and as we get ready for winter we want you to know we have an important new option in our storm closing system." The option was we are going remote. The option might be new for the system but not for schools or business. Like the school, if it snows, we will still be on *Zoom*. Just like they said, it has been a year like no other. It has been hard on everyone; but I am praying that it is going to get better by spring or summer.

The Regathering Committee is working on the plans for having Sunday services at church. Worshippers will have to be in the hall because of spacing 6 feet apart. When they are finished, we will submit the plans to the Diocese for approval; so when it is safe for us to meet, we will be ready. Our bishops do not want churches having indoor services or any other thing until it is safe to do so. The way COVID is right now I do not want to put us in any danger.

I want you to know that even though the church building is closed, we still are busy. We have regular church services on *Zoom* each Wednesday at 11AM and on Sunday at 10AM. We would love to have you join us. Some of our parishioners are making phone calls to say hi and see if you need anything. If you would like to call a few parishioners just contact me as I need a few more people to do this. We recently sent a donation to the Whitman Food Pantry to help them buy food. We have placed a plastic bin on the bench on the church porch. Inside there are *Forward Day by Day* booklets and copies of Sunday lessons' pamphlets for you to take. Since we cannot have our regular fund- raising projects, Dick has come up with another idea. Right now, he is selling chances to win a Duraflame infra-red electric stove with heater. If you are interested in it, give Dick a call at 339-933-9111. Rev. Billie is willing to have a Book Club or Bible Study group on *Zoom*. If you are interested in one of these, call her at 617-584-2737. If she gets enough people, she could start these after Christmas. If you need any help, contact Rev. Billie or Regina 781-335-5838. If you are sick, let us know so we can put you on the prayer list.

I really miss seeing you at church, at coffee hour and at our various programs. I look forward to the day when it will be safe to open All Saints and we can celebrate being together again. I pray that you will have a wonderful, blessed Christmas and please join us on *Zoom* for our church services.

It's been a punk year for Fundraising, as we were not allowed to do much. Up until March, things were normal:

Breakfasts (1st Sunday of every month)	\$ 256
Trivia Contest, January 25	143
Winter Yard Sale	221
Toll House Cookie Contest	108
Valentine's Raffle	28
Corned Beef Supper, March 7	543

The Plant Sale in May, thanks to Regina's tomato plants, made \$340, but only members of the congregation knew about it. We missed out on the Craft Show in October (usually earning over \$900), and the Church Fair is reduced to a "Fairless Fair," and has so far made \$1,255. (The real Fair earns about \$2,300.) You may still send in your contributions to make the Fairless Fair seem a little better.

The Thanksgiving Basket Raffle sold 207 tickets, and made \$130 dollars. Irene Darcy was the winner. The Electric Heater raffle will be drawn on December 18. We have sold 77 tickets so far and made \$60, with plenty of time left to buy yours. This is a really classy heater.

Altogether, Fundraising has made \$3,404 so far, with goal of \$8,000. Oh well.
